- Represent the entire community, its values and perceptions in the facility-planning process.
- Evaluate current elementary school needs and develop a comprehensive plan to address district growth, facility capacity, and supporting quality educational programs.
- Bring forward recommendations to the Board of Trustees as to how to address the district's facility needs.



DISTRICT / CITY GROWTH

- Growth is happening now!
- Timing of growth is driven by market conditions
 - Strong economic indicators
 - Low unemployment
 - Job growth
- Denison will continue to ride the positive economic wave
- Forecast between 100 and 150 new housing units per year for the nearterm future (next 5 years)
- Community needs additional building lots to sustain new home growth

MAYES ELEMENTARY ISSUES



- Student enrollment has exceeded the building's functional capacity
 - Undersized cafeteria
 - Kitchen one serving line
 - Undersized CORE areas
 - Main entry & admin spaces are undersized
 - Limited Parking
 - Limited parent drop-off / pick-up areas
- Service area for kitchen located at front entry
- Courtyard drainage
- Courtyard "wall" Issue
- Site drainage from courtyard



HYDE PARK ELEMENTARY ISSUES



- Student enrollment as exceeded the building's functional capacity
 - Undersized cafeteria
 - Kitchen one serving line
 - Undersized CORE areas
 - Limited staff parking
 - Limited parent drop-off / pick-up areas
- "New" Addition not looped back to main building

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION



RECOMMENDATION

- The FPC recognizes our role in providing a recommendation to the Board of Trustees and that the Board will determine the structure and content of a potential bond issue.
- The FPC achieved consensus for a recommendation of a November 5, 2019 bond election to address the highest priorities of enrollment growth and capacity issues at Mayes and Hyde Park Elementary Schools.





FINANCIAL INFORMATION

- The proposal is estimated to have a total estimated cost of between \$21 \$22
 million
 - Updated information related to debt and debt capacity will be made available to the Board of Trustees in the coming months.

Estimated tax rate increase for a \$21 - \$22 million bond program is a maximum of \$0.03.


DENISON REGISTERED VOTERS






DENISON ISD

Over **68%** of eligible staff are registered to vote.




34.9% of parents are registered to vote




MAY 2011 BOND TURNOUT

Voters by Gender




Voters by district affiliation



Staff and parents represented just 12.7% of voter turnout.


Voters by Age

 - Growth Rates & Student Capacity
 - Performance Data
 - Age/Condition of Building
